A new component of this year's History Meets the Arts is its partnership with Pink Out, Inc. of Hanover, PA. The Pink Out Women's Cancer Fund was established in 2007

to provide financial assistance to breast cancer patients. It has since expanded its cause to cover all types of cancers affecting women, such as ovarian and cervical cancers. Instead of helping with medical expenses, this fund was designed to help with daily living expenses such as rent, food and utilities. It also helps to purchase aids that insurance does not cover such as wigs, prostheses and special garments.

While there is no fee for admission to the show other than the required ticket for the Thursday night opening night preview party, a suggested \$5.00 one-time donation will be asked of attendees for entry to the college ballroom. Representatives from Pink Out, Inc. will be on hand with more information about their non-profit organization. Donations of any amount are greatly appreciated and all entry proceeds will benefit this worthy cause.

Forest Sentinels: The Gauntlet Runner Book III by S. Thomas Bailey. **AUTHOR SIGNING June 13 & 14 at HMTA**

This is the third installment in the author's Gauntlet Runner series of historical novels. In *Forest Sentinels*, coming off the disaster on the Monongahela, Jacob Murray and his young friend Joshua return to Fort Cumberland under

the command of George Washington. The defeated British army soon withdraws further east, leaving the frontier virtually undefended. With the frontier left unprotected, Delaware raiding parties begin striking the settlers in an effort to clear their lands of the English.

Jacob and Joshua lead a company of militia deep into the French-held Pennsylvania frontier. They plan to build a fort that will not only give the local settlers peace of mind and added protection, but serve as a 'home base' from which they can continue the search for Jacob's wife Maggie and Joshua's best friend One-Ear. Though the raids seem to lessen with the presence of the well-constructed fort, the Delaware have not withdrawn completely. A rescue mission soon turns out disastrous when the men are ambushed and Jacob is taken prisoner. Help often comes from unexpected sources, and the Murrays soon find themselves face to face with ghosts from the past and a mysterious band of sentinels that are keeping watch over the Pennsylvania forests.


The Smoke at Dawn: A Novel of the Civil War by Jeff Shaara. **AUTHOR SIGNING June 13 & 14 at HMTA**

In their second collaboration, renowned Lincoln and Civil War historian Michael Burlingame and acclaimed landscape photographer Robert Shaw tell the story

of Lincoln's central role in the legendary events of Gettysburg. Shaw's dynamic images are woven together with Burlingame's outstanding writing and Lincoln's telegrams, letters, and speeches to create a dramatic

exploration of Lincoln and the Gettysburg story. The book covers the seven month window of time in 1863, beginning with the invasion of Pennsylvania, through the Battle of Gettysburg and the end of the Gettysburg Campaign—leading to the development of the first national cemetery on a battlefield.
