Horse hair pottery is created by applying horse hair and feathers to the surface of the 1000 degree pot surface, which instantly carbonize onto the smooth white surface creating beautiful abstract patterns.

Again, most of our "other" offerings are handmade in the U.S. by various craftsmen, and should make a unique addition to anyone's home. Please consider Lord Nelson's the next time you're looking for one of a kind gifts and artwork to decorate your home.



mustangs and Quarter Horses.





New From John Buxton



"Blacksmith of Venango - 1752" by John Buxton

This is a portrait of John Frazier who, with a few other English traders on the upper Allegheny River (PA) in 1752, were visited by friendly local natives that appreciated his skill at metal repair. By mid-1753 the French had taken his cabin in Venango and he fled to Turtle Creek near the Monongahela River. His cabin there was visited by young George Washington in 1753 and 1754.

THE ART OF THE PIPE TOMAHAWK



The pipe tomahawk is a part of American history and has been made by some of the riflesmith artisans who were active in building the American long rifles in the 18th century. Some of the high art tomahawks were presented to the chief of a tribe as a gesture of friendship. Possession of one of these tomahawks became a status symbol. The British government

on occasion would commission certain gun builders to make presentation tomahawks when they were going to an important meeting or treaty with a tribe.

The tomahawk pictured above was built today, by Wayne Watson. Wayne's been a craftsman for decades, and his talents drew the attention of Michael Mann, producer/director of the movie, "The Last of the Mohicans". Wayne was hired to produce historically-accurate war clubs, tomahawks and the legendary "kill-deer" rifle carried by Daniel Day-Lewis, the star of the movie.

This particular tomahawk's head is hand forged, with over 130 inlays in the head alone. The .999 pure silver inlay is then filed flush with the metal surface of the tomahawk. On the handle, there is a scale of justice bordered by the sword of

enforcement and the olive branch of mercy. Wayne adopted this from a tomahawk made in 1760. The handle is approximately 23 inches long, with the head just over 8 inches long.



At press time, there are a few of Wayne's tomahawks in the gallery and they range in price from \$3,000.00 to \$4,500.00. These are original works of art, from one of the best makers in the country.

More Awards for Gallery Artists!

War on the Run: The Epic Story of Robert Rogers and the Conquest of America's First Frontier by John F. Ross

Fur Trade: A Material Culture, 17631850 by Ryan R. Gale.


This book is a comprehensive guide to the material culture of the

lection of nearly one hundred and fifty never-before published original documents containing the speeches of 18th century Native-American orators who

spoke in dozens of councils with white men, both British and American, during the years of the American Revolution.

Painstakingly transcribed from the Sir Frederick Haldimand Papers collection housed in the British Library and on loan from copies held in the National Archives of Canada, this collection of Native-American speeches is arranged in chronological order from the beginning of the war until its end in 1784, recreating an unbroken record of what was said by an 18th century indigenous people who had no means of recording themselves.

Each document reveals a written account of what was spoken by both village and war chiefs at a particular time and place in the many councils held with both the British and Americans during the war years. The reason these speeches exist at all in archives is that the white officers attending the councils had with them at the time both a translator

who could speak the language of the tribe attending the council and, more importantly, a white man who was able to write in English the words spoken by the native ora-

importantly, a white man who was able to write in English the words spoken by the native orator as quickly as they were translated by the person present who could speak the language. Consequently, these speeches together comprise an unbroken record of what 18th century Indian orators said at councils held at

Together, this collection of 18th century Native-American voices from the American Revolution serves as a unique, never-before heard, poignant and heart-rending testament of an indigenous people lost in the turbulence of American history.

Braddock's March: How the Man Sent to Seize a Continent Changed American

<u>History</u> by Thomas E. Crocker. General Edward Braddock was sent by Great Britain on a mission to drive France once and for all from the New World. Accompanied by the largest armed expeditionary force ever sent to North America, Braddock's primary target was the Forks of the

Ohio (present day Pittsburgh), where he planned to seize Fort Duquesne and then march north to the Canadian border.

The expedition began its nearly 250-mile trek in May 1755, heroically cutting through dense wilderness, fording rivers, and scaling the Appalachian Mountains. Braddock was joined on the expedition by a young Virginia colonel, George Washington, and others who would later play roles in the future revolution. Among those driving the wagons were Daniel Boone and Daniel Morgan.

Braddock's advance column was annihilated short of Fort Duquesne, by combined French and Indian forces. Over two-thirds of Braddock's British and colonial troops

suffered casualties. Braddock himself fell mortally wounded, while George Washington miraculously escaped harm despite four bullet holes through his clothing. With this battle, North America at once started and was drawn into a global war between Britain and France.

In Braddock's March: How the Man Sent to Seize a Continent Changed American History, the author uses a wealth of sources, including newly discovered letters, to tell the story of one of the most important events in the American colonial period. This fateful march opened the first major road for westward expansion, anointed a national hero in George Washington, and sowed the seeds for the American Revolution. 384 pages, hardback, 2009, 60 b/w illustrations, \$28.00 plus ship.



With Zeal and with Bayonets Only: The British Army on Campaign in North America, 1775-1783 By Matthew H. Spring

This ground-breaking book offers a new analysis of the

British Army during the "American rebellion" at both operational and tactical levels. Presenting fresh insights into the speed of British tactical movements, Spring discloses how the system for training the army prior to 1775 was overhauled and adapted to the peculiar conditions confronting it in North America.

Written with flair and a wealth of details that will engage scholars and history enthusiasts alike, With Zeal and with Bayonets Only offers a thorough reinterpretation of how the British Army's North American campaign progressed and invites serious reassessment of most of its battles. After reading this book, no one will picture Redcoats the same way

Author Matthew Spring holds a Ph.D. in history from the University of Leeds and teaches history at Truro School, an independent secondary school in Cornwall, England.




Ranger Dawn: The American Ranger from the Co*lonial Era to the Mexican* War by Col. Robert W. Black. This book is an early history of the forerunners of one of the world's most elite military units, the U.S. Army Rangers. It covers the periods of the French and Indian War, the Revolution, the War of 1812, the Texas War of Independence, and the Mexican War while featuring Ranger pioneers like Robert Rogers, Francis Marion, and George Rogers Clark.

Every Home a Fort, Every Man a Warrior by Michael Edward Nogay

In this new book, you'll discover stories of the forts and men in the upper Ohio Valley during the American Revolutionary War detailing the Northern Panhandle of West Virginia and the Upper Ohio Valley during the Revolutionary War from 1775-1795.



You'll also read chapters about Ft. Henry hero Captain Samuel Mason, who later became a river boat pirate, and Lewis Wetzel and his brothers are contained therein, as is the famous frontier story of Andrew Poe's epic battle in hand-to-hand combat with the Indian known as Big Foot.

The book is the result of research by attorney Michael Nogay who spent over two years on the project and reveals several secrets from the Revolutionary War era in Western Virginia that have been left untold for over 235 years. The book contains descriptions of over 35 forts and blockhouses, all of which are shown on a detailed map of the period. Paperback, 128 pages, \$14.95 plus shipping.

Opening the Door West DVD: The Story

of the Ohio Company and the first legal American Settlement of the Northwest Territory

This full length historical documentary film tells the story of the first official settlement in Ohio. The

Ohio Company of Associates, a stock company headed by Revolutionary War hero

Rufus Putnam, built forts and established the community of Marietta at the mouth of the Muskingum River in the late 1780s.

The program's 11 "chapters," which run from 6 to 20 minutes each, discuss the company's dual objectives of making a profit and spreading democracy in a model settlement, the competing goals of and eventual warfare between the settlers and the Native Americans they displaced, the hardships the settlers faced, and the importance of the Northwest Ordinance as a template for American settlement of the West.

The narration is supplemented with quotes and extensive commentary from historians, Native American tribal leaders, and descendents of settlers. Visuals include location footage, period art and illustrations, computer generated images that recreate the countryside and settlement buildings as they might have looked in the 1780s, and historically correct reenactments.

While the program will be of the greatest interest to students of Ohio history, it does offer viewers a glimpse into life on the frontier and the often overlooked settlement of the Northwest Territory and explains its importance as a model for the settlement of the western United States.


