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The 12th annual History Meets the Arts (HMTA) show is right around the corner with over 30 artists, authors and artisans to appear once again at Lord Nelson's Gallery for the event in historic Gettysburg, April 17-19. You'll meet with and witness works from the various artists, most of whom will be set up at the Gettysburg Fire Company as well as three artists appearing in the gallery. The artists will represent a wide variety of genres including 18th & 19th century periods, Celtic, fantasy, wildlife, nostalgic, dogs, Native American, and more.

This will be your chance to see the latest paintings, speak to the artists in person, or have your print personalized. You can also purchase that rare, hard to find book or learn how a bronze sculpture is created - one of the oldest and certainly one of the most permanent of all art forms. Then explore the contemporary 18th century period accoutrements made by some of the country's finest artisans. Discover the art in powder horns, porcupine quill work bags and neck knives, tomahawks, traditional redware pottery, and more. This is a feast for the eyes, an education in history and technique, and the opportunity to view and purchase your favorite items directly from their respective creators.

On the field adjacent to the Fire Hall, you'll discover numerous 18th century sutlers, encampments, period demonstrations including blacksmithing, scrimshaw and horn making, traditional Indian items, and more - all managed by the expertise of Village Restorations with Roland Cadle.

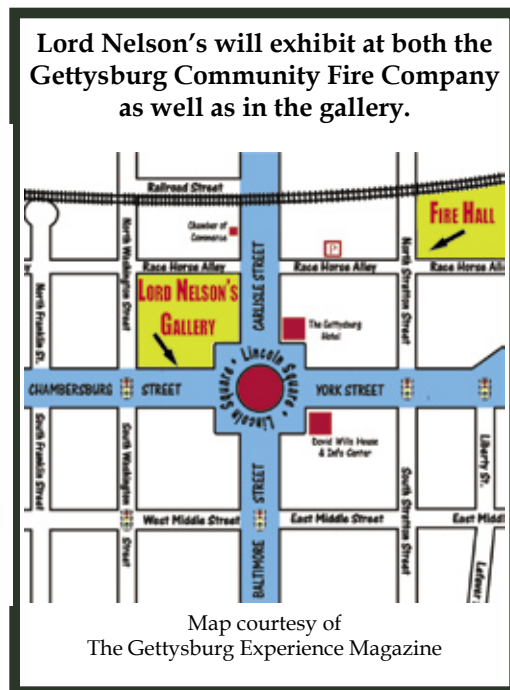

ON THE BOOKSHELF

A Soldier-Like Way, the Material Culture of the British Infantry 1751-1768,

the French & Indian War era,
by R. R. Gale. This book is a most comprehensive work on the British infantry material culture to date, brimming with

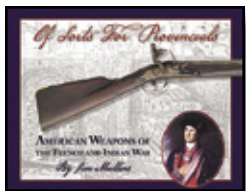
exquisite full color photos of original artifacts and paintings. The story of the British infantry, their daily life, weapons, tools, food, and clothing is described in the soldier's own words, utilizing entries from original journals, orderly books, and official papers. Though there is an emphasis on the French & Indian War in America, this book covers the entire British infantry, at home and abroad, in war-time and peacetime.

The 8-1/2" by 11" horizontal format allows for 22" long spreads of original firearms and swords. Examples are shown of every major pattern of infantry musket used from 1751-1768, as well as a variety of other items such as: swords, pistols, fusils, cartridge pouches, belly boxes, bayonets & scabbards, ball molds, powder horns, uniforms, shoes, buttons, buckles, sewing tools, camp equipment, axes, shovels, tent pegs, eating utensils, haversacks, canteens, coins, medical devices, gorgets, medals, sashes, and much more! A special chapter on Scottish Highlanders shows their unique blend of English and Scottish uniforms and weapons.

"A Soldier-Like Way" is a must have for the French & Indian War and general mid 18th century historian, re-enactor, collector, and artist. Softcover, 144 pages, filled with large full color images, \$32.50.



Of Sorts for Provincials, American Weapons of the French & Indian War by Jim Mullins.

This new book boldly displays the firearms, swords, and accouterments of the American provincial soldiers during the French and Indian War, 1754 - 1763. Unlike their British counterparts, the American provincials were issued a wide range of weapons. These were often old, used, and in poor condition, guns that were described by British officers as "of sorts for Provincial". These weapons did not come only from British contractors and the Board of Ordnance, but from foreign countries such as Holland, Belgium, and France. Each style of long arm came with a unique bayonet, many of which are shown throughout the book.

Printed in landscape format, the 11 x 8-1/2" format allows for beautiful wide color photos. Close-up views of the unique maker's marks, proof marks, top views, and detail views show features rarely revealed. Besides weapons, the accouterments used by the soldiers are also covered, including cartridge pouches and boxes, shot pouches, powder horns, powder measures, cleaning tools and more. "Of Sorts for Provincials" is a must-have book for any French and Indian War historian, re-enactor, or collector.

Simon Girty: Turncoat Hero

by Phillip W. Hoffman. Author Phillip Hoffman spent 17 years studying every detail of Girty's life and times, amassing more than 4,000 computer windows of research. By exploring microfilm, ledgers, military records, congressional records, newspaper and magazine articles, and dozens of early American and Canadian fiction and non-fiction works, Hoffman was able to peel away the mythic legend that has hidden Girty's real persona for two and a half centuries.

Hoffman's dedication to detail, combined with his superb talent as a storyteller, brings you an intimate view of the full sweep of early American frontier conflicts, as experienced by a devoted adventurer whose heart was as much Indian as it was white.

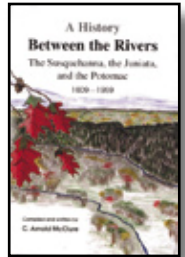
A History, Between the Rivers, the Susquehanna, the Juniata, and the Potomac, 1609 - 1959 by C. Arnold McClure.

Pennsylvania journalist C. Arnold McClure provides a chronological history of the people who have lived between the rivers of central Pennsylvania and western Maryland. Drawing primarily from newspaper accounts of events and milestones of the first 350 years of Pennsylvania and American history, McClure has supplemented the information with diary and other personal accounts, government records, and the writings of other historians. This book records the history of the European overflow into the colonies of America. From the discovery of the Delaware Bay to the resulting settlements on the banks of the Delaware River, the Potomac River, the Susquehanna River, and the Juniata River, historic milestones are dated and recorded in this book. Whether it's a significant international development or on the local level, all events are listed chronologically, by region.

C. Arnold McClure, a veteran of the Vietnam War, has been publisher of a weekly newspaper in Orbisonia, Pennsylvania, for 28 years. This book is the first in a series of books he intends to publish, that have resulted from his more than 20 years of research into Pennsylvania history.

One of the living history presenters at the outdoor encampment on the grounds of the firehall, presented by Village Restorations



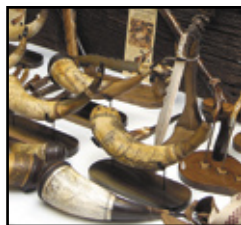
Selinda Kennedy will travel down from her home in Northern PA to showcase her latest works of period redware pottery.

Above left is "When Rifles are Empty", an Indian warrior who decides to take up the war club rather than risk taking the time to reload his empty rifle.



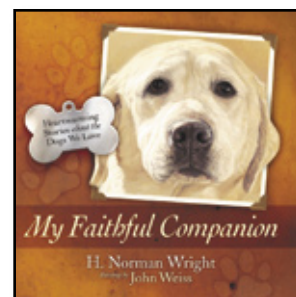

THE DAVID WILLS HOUSE OPENS IN DOWNTOWN GETTYSBURG

*In July 1863
the American
Civil War came

After a multi-year renovation, The David Wills House, part of Gettysburg National Military Park, just opened on historic Lincoln Square in downtown Gettysburg. Here, you will learn how a simple invitation from local attorney David Wills resulted in the most famous speech in American history and you will stand in the room where President Lincoln revised the Gettysburg Address. It will also provide you a glimpse into how the battle affected the local citizens of this small south central Pennsylvania farming community.
