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## HISTORY MEETS THE ARTS

### APRIL 20-23, 2006 GETTYSBURG, PA

The ninth annual History Meets the Arts (HMTA) Festival is right around the corner and over 60 artists, authors and artisans are once again scheduled to appear for the event in historic Gettysburg, April 20-23.

With Lord Nelson's Gallery during HMTA, you'll meet with and witness works from over 20 artists, most of whom will be set up at the Gettysburg Fire Company as well as three artists appearing in the gallery.

The artists will host a wide variety of genres including 18th & 19th century periods, aviation, Celtic, fantasy, classic fairy tale, nostalgic, dogs, Native American, and more.

This will be your chance to see the latest paintings, speak to the artists in person, have your print personalized, purchase that rare, hard to find book, learn and see how a bronze sculpture is created - one of the oldest and certainly one of the most permanent of all art forms. Then move over into the contemporary 18th century period accoutrements made by some of the country's finest artisans. Discover the art in powder horns,

porcupine quill work bags and neck knives, tomahawks, 18th century pistols, hunting bags, traditional redware pottery, and more. This is a feast for the eyes, an education in history and technique, and the opportunity to view and purchase your favorite items directly from their respective creators.

On the field adjacent to the Fire Hall, you'll discover numerous 18th century sutlers, encampments, period demonstrations including flint napping, scrimshaw and horn making, traditional Indian items, British army units with black powder demonstrations, etc.

This living history encampment will be anchored by a hand hewn two story 18th century period blockhouse, built and erected by "Village Restorations" of PA. Village Restorations primarily offers three areas of expertise: historic restoration, historic reproductions, and historic education representing the 17th, 18th and early 19th century. # HISTORY MEETS THE ARTS • THE ENTIRE EVENT

Thursday evening April 20th from 7:00 to 9:00 p.m. will kick off of HMTA at the newly constructed Gateway Gettysburg Conference and Movie theater complex at the Route 15 & 30 interchange (about 2 miles east of downtown Gettysburg).



The opening event will feature the public premiere of the \$7 million, 30 minute introductory film to the Battle of Gettysburg titled "Fields of Freedom", with scoring performed by the London Symphony Orchestra and the reading of the Gettysburg address by former President George H.W. Bush. The film will be presented in a digital giant screen format. Attending HMTA artists will be the VIP guests with a scheduled reception at this premiere.

A \$25.00 ticket provides you access to the film premiere, a wine & cheese reception with attending HMTA artists and film producers, art exhibits, and a chance to win great prizes. Please contact Lord Nelson's Gallery or Main Street Gettysburg at 717-337-3491 to reserve your seat(s).

Friday night at the newly renovated Majestic Theater in downtown Gettysburg will feature lectures and the showing of the films *Friday Nights Lights* and *Remember the Titans*. Actual coaches depicted in *Remember the Titans* will be at the Majestic on Friday. The films will run during the entire festival weekend.

Visitors to HMTA can also view the artwork of approximately 50 Gettysburg area high school students who will be creating Abraham Lincoln based artwork to celebrate the opening of the newly restored Lincoln Train Station in downtown Gettysburg. An attending HMTA artist, Wendy Allen, will instruct the students in March who will then have 30 days to create their own works of art with Lincoln as the subject matter. That art will be on display at the Train Station with the opening reception for that exhibit on Friday, April 21, as part of the festivities.

The entire event is family friendly and has no admission charge (except for the movie premiere and other special events). The artists are eager to meet with you and make themselves available during gallery hours and special receptions, dinners or other events. Children and students are encouraged to bring their art to these acclaimed artists who will critique their work if asked, will give advice and encouragement to budding artists of the future.

In addition to the thrill of meeting a favorite artist, participants of History Meets the Arts come away from the experience with a greater sense of what came before them, learning what helped to shape us as a people, cultivating and culminating in festival attendees an enthusiasm for all eras of history. 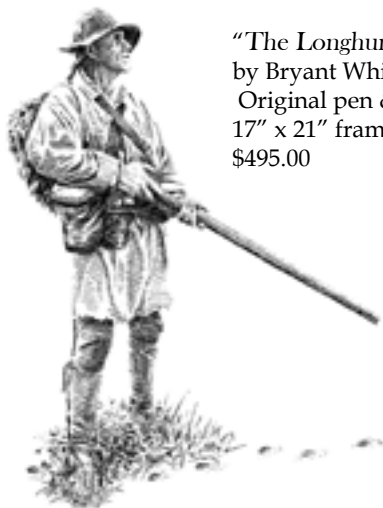

## ON THE BOOKSHELF

**A Most Troublesome Situation: The British Military and the Pontiac Indian Uprising of 1763-1764** by Timothy J. Todish and Todd E. Harburn.



At the conclusion of the French Indian War, the triumphant British took possession of a vast area west of the Appalachians in the Great Lakes region. It was not only replete with a lucrative fur trade and almost infinite colonization possibilities, but also hostile Indians harboring lingering loyalties to their former French allies. It was not long before overly-strict British regulation of the fur trade, coupled with a perceived arrogance, further fueled Indian resentment of colonial expansion into their territories. Pontiac's Uprising, or Pontiac's Conspiracy, of 1763, named after the Ottawa chief generally recognized as one of its main catalysts, was the violent, sometimes horrifying tribal reaction in 1763 against two short years of controversial British military rule.

This important new book looks at the Pontiac Uprising through the eyes of the British military, yet treats both sides fairly and honestly. There was legitimacy to the positions of both the British and the Indians, but it was also a brutal war in which both committed extreme, and sometimes unnecessary, acts of violence. Using numerous excerpts from period accounts, the authors tell the story through the eyes and the minds of those who were caught up in it. The sieges of forts Detroit and Pitt, as well as the losses of smaller posts, are told in great detail. Many more obscure events are also brought to life. Major Robert Rogers' expedition to the Great Lakes, Captain Thomas Morris' brave but futile journey to the Illinois country, the defeat of Cuyler's relief party, the remarkable story of the shipwrecked survivors of the sloop Michigan, the formation of the unique "Platoons," the Battle of Buffalo Creek and the little known ambush at Roche a Davion are all told in exciting detail.

The main text is supplemented with appendices that explain the makeup of the garrisons of the various posts, what the sites are like today, and also a retelling of the remarkable Indian captivity of John Ruth-erford. In addition to many period drawings and maps, excellent artwork by modern artists Robert Griffing and Gary Zaboly brings the text to life. 224 pages, 8 1/2 x 11, paperback, \$20.00.

**Chief Logan: An Anthology**: - (3 BOOKS IN 1) includes LOGAN THE MINGO by FRANKLIN SAWVEL; TAH-GAH-JUTE; OR LOGAN AND CAPTAIN MICHAEL CRESAP by BRANTZ MAYER; and CHIEF LOGAN: FRIEND, FOE OR FICTION by RON WENNING.

Chief Logan was one of the most enigmatic Indians of his time. The son of a great Iroquois chief, Thomas Jefferson would call him the greatest orator of the 18th century. And yet this once great, kind and gentle friend of whites and spiritual leader of his people would see his life spiral downward; committing him to wander his remaining years on the frontier a tortured and broken man.



Logan grew up at Shikellamy's Town along the West Branch of the Susquehanna River yet his world fame would come in his later years.

This famous 18th century Indian is better known as Chief Logan and this anthology will help you to better understand this complicated man. The first book is *Logan the Mingo* by Franklin B. Sawvel which explains Logan's life in an easy and understanding way. The second selection published in 1851 by Brantz Mayer 1851, endeavors to explain the Cresap/Greathouse controversy and how Chief Logan came to lay the blame for his families murders at the hands of Michael Cresap when in fact the Greathouse gang was responsible. This tragic turn of events led to "Logan's Lament", the most famous words ever spoken by an American Indian. The sadness and sorrow from those words will echo through time immortal. Finally is Ron Wenning's 1997 article *Chief Logan: Friend, Foe or Fiction* uncovers who the real Chief Logan really was.

Logan's last years would be one filled with melancholy and sadness and he would be destined to wander the Ohio Frontier a broken and dejected man. His life had come full circle. From his days as a child playfully roaming the beautiful Buffalo Valley of the West Branch of the Susquehanna River at his father's side was reduced at the end to begging for whiskey among the officers at Fort Detroit, somehow comforting his tormented soul in death. 224 pages, hardback, \$34.95.

**Juniata, River of Sorrows: DVD** by Dennis McInay.

This DVD is a 37 minute multimedia presentation that compliments the book of the same title by Dennis McInay, and contains over 200 full color



photos the author took on his float trip down the Juniata River in central Pennsylvania, rare maps and documents from the 1600's and 1700's, stirring classical music and complete narration by the author.

The DVD has eight "chapters" consisting of: The Juniata River, The Standing Stone People, The Lenni Lenape, The Colonists, The Long Narrows, The Fall of Fort Granville, Armstrong's Raid on Kit-tanning, and Juniata Island.

The disk mostly examines the river basin's past while visually complimenting the historical narra-tion with photos of the river as it is today. The DVD is a perfect multimedia companion to the book, or an equally informative stand alone presentation to the history of the region. Juniata, River of Sorrows: One Man's Journey into a River's Tragic Past is one of the best selling regional books in the United States.

**"The War That Made America"** brings to life a vastly important—but often misunderstood—period of American history, a period that set in motion forces that would culminate in the American Revolution. The dramatic documentary tells the story of the French and Indian War (1754-1763), which began in the wilderness of the Penn-sylvania frontier and spread throughout the colonies, into Canada, and ultimately around the world. This is the 4 hour PBS documentary mini-series which aired earlier this year.



The documentary is nar-rated and hosted by Graham Greene, the Academy-Award nominated actor for "Dances With Wolves" and an Oneida Indian whose ancestors fought in this war.

A central figure in the documentary is George Wash-ington, then a brash and ambitious young officer in his twenties hoping to make his reputation in the military, whose blunders actually trigger the war. A primary focus of the series, and a story that has long been distorted or forgotten, is the critical mili-tary importance and strategic diplomacy of Native Americans in the conflict between the English and French for the expansion of their colonial empires. It was a war the British won, but the fruit of their vic-tory contained the seeds of the Revolutionary War.

This is a great overview and solid introduction to the French & Indian War but the serious historical student may find some discrepancies and debatable content (or lack thereof).

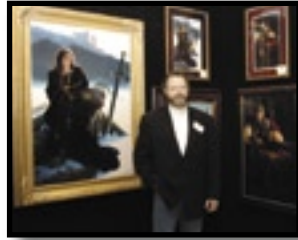




# MORE ART, SCULPTURE & 18TH CENTURY ACCOUTREMENTS

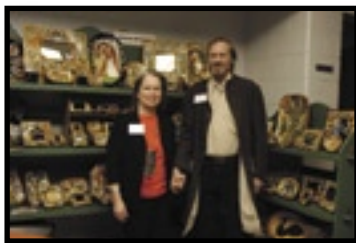

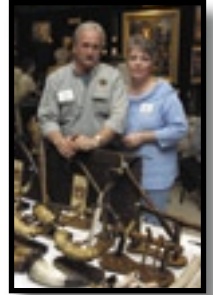
